# The story of the North Star Hotel

In the 18th century the area around this hotel was coastline and was popularly known as “The Strand”. Before the Custom House could be built, great oak beams had to be laid on the marshy soil to provide foundations. In fact, this area was rural and considered outside the city.

Amiens Street was called after the Viscount Amiens, which was a minor title of the Earl of Aldborough (whose splendid Town House still stands in Portland Row, a short distance from here). The hotel was built early in the 19th century, and pre-dates the Railway Station by several decades. At that time, the “Great North Road”, as it could be called, started from here, and, as a consequence, several hotels sprang up in this street alone.

The site where Connolly Station now stands was a pound for stray horses. All travel was by horse and coach, or private carriage, in those days and a large livery stables, at the back of the North Star, gave it a distinct advantage over its rivals.

This was the mid 19th century, and the owner’s name was Mr. James Carolin. He was a first class hotelier and made his country guests comfortable and happy during their stay in Dublin. The city was making steady recovery from the Famine and new enterprises were springing up: the nearby docks were flourishing and the trains were leaving from across the street.

All this activity brought great business to the hotel. In 1892 a Mr. J.C. Malone bought it, and at once started a major programme of extension, re-decoration and modernization. His advertisements tell us, among other things, that  
“the most scrupulous and absolute cleanliness is a marked feature in every department of the establishment”,  
who could ask for more!

The Golden age of the railways came and went. Today the car has superseded the train for long journeys (more or less). Still the North Star flourishes. Bedrooms have been built where once stables and carriage houses stood.

Mr. Brian McGettigan is now the Proprietor and a whole new era is opening up for this fine old Hostelry. We do hope that your stay here, however long or short, will be a happy one.

In the year 1893 the below advertisement appeared in the Irish Times.

Bed and breakfast could be had in the North Star for as little as 2/6 (12 cents). However this sum is put into perspective when one considers that a glass of whiskey cost about 1 cent. Many a working man received a weekly wage of 18/6 (about 92 cents).

The Hotel has been immortalized by James Joyce in his book "Ulysses". The following passage appears on Page 705,

"anticipated, there was not a sign of a Jehu plying for hire anywhere to be seen except a four wheeler, probably engaged by some fellows inside on the spree, outside the North Star Hotel and there was no symptom of its budging a quarter of an inch when Mr Bloom, who was anything but a professional whistler, endeavoured to hail it by emitting a kind of a whistle, holding his arms arched over his head, twice.

Stately, plump Buck Mulligan came from the stairhead, bearing a bowl of lather on which a mirror and a razor lay crossed. A yellow dressinggown, ungirdled, was sustained gently behind him by the mild morning air. He held the bowl aloft and intoned :

— *Introibo ad altare Dei.*

Halted, he peered down the dark winding stairs and called up coarsely :  
— Come up, Kinch. Come up, you fearful Jesuit.

Solemnly he came forward and mounted the round gunrest. He faced about and blessed gravely thrice the tower, the surrounding country and the awaking mountains. Then, catching sight of Stephen Dedalus, he bent towards him and made rapid crosses in the air, gurgling in his throat and shaking his head. Stephen Dedalus, displeased and sleepy, leaned his arms on the top of the staircase and looked coldly at the shaking gurgling face that blessed him, equine in its length, and at the light untousured hair, grained and hued like pale oak.

Buck Mulligan peeped an instant under the mirror and then covered the bowl smartly.

— Back to barracks, he said sternly.

He added in a preacher's tone :

— For this, O dearly beloved, is the genuine *Christine* : body and soul and blood and ouns. Slow music, please. Shut your eyes, gents. One moment. A little trouble about those white corpuscles. Silence, all.

He peered sideways up and gave a long low whistle of call then paused awhile in rapt attention, his even white teeth glistening here and there with gold points. Chrysostomos. Two strong shrill whistles answered through the calm.

— Thanks, old chap, he cried briskly. That will do nicely. Switch off the current, will you ?
